

On Friday Lunch we had Rotarian Phil Godfrey from Solihull Rotary Club talking about APS Support UK - APS stands for Antiphospholipid Syndrome which is an autoimmune disease which causes the blood to clot too quickly both in veins and arteries. Early diagnosis and treatment of this condition could prevent heart attack, stroke, DVT and miscarriage. It was a very informative talk and very thought provoking.




Ed. In order to promote the condition and fundraise in memory of his late wife, Paul set out to travel around the coastline of the British Isles by rail.

She gave a very interesting talk about how the Charity supported young people suffering from cancer by supplying them with suitable bikes so they can enjoy the pleasure of being outside. The Charity also supplies other members of the family with bikes so the whole family can ride off together.

On Sunday 12th I represented the Club, along with Surinder and Mark Recchia, at the event at The Whateley Hall organised by Tooley's Boatyard to celebrate the newly formed Tooley's Boatyard Trust. It was the 250th anniversary of 'a General Assembly of the Company of Proprietors of the Oxford Canal Navigation', in effect the birth of the Oxford Canal which took place at The Three Tuns on Horsefair which is now the Whately Hall. It was a very enjoyable evening and historically extremely interesting.

Monday night was another lengthy Contact Weekend meeting - all seems to be going well with a lot to do but with the end in sight!!

At Friday lunch our own Nigel Randall. He spoke about his experience serving as an RAF Navigator during the Cold War.

Speaker Reports

Rachel Wignell - Cyclists Fighting Cancer

Several years ago the Chief executive, Kevin Musgrave, was diagnosed with cancer and spent a considerable amount of time in hospital and undergoing treatments of chemotherapy and radiotherapy. During this period, he invested time in researching the background for the disease with an emphasis on discovering what personal activities to adopt that would assist him in managing and overcoming the impact of the illness. As a result, as a response to his return to good health, he decided to form a charity to assist cancer suffers and specifically young children.



He discovered that numerous scientific studies have established that the single most effective way of improving physical and mental wellness for individuals surviving cancer is physical exercise.

The exercise benefits have been proved to:

- Improve the heart and muscles
- Increase waste loss efforts
- Cycling is a low impact support that assist those with joint conditions
- Increase longevity
- Improve mental health and the immune system

This registered charity was formed in 2005, is a company limited by guarantee and managed by a board of Trustees. The plan for 2019 is to provide

600 cycles, principally to children suffering from cancer and if this plan is met then the total of number of cycles donated will increase above five thousand.

Unfortunately, the limited technology available to Rachel prevented her from showing several videos of very young children on the bicycles in her presentation. Fortuitously however she had included several single photographs of children supported who were cancer sufferers but also included some amputees. The smiling faces of the youngsters were inspirational for all those attending the presentation.

The charity also distributes some trikes, tandems and other equipment and support. It is aware that cancer can also create massive disruption within families and does offer additional cycles to siblings and parents to allow families to join in social activity together.

The charity is based in Alderminster, Warwickshire, manages four local retail shops and relies heavily on volunteers creating local fund-raising events. In addition, sums are raised by the kind support of sportsmen and women who take part in major challenges events such as The London Marathon, treks across mountain ranges in the UK and throughout the world. Later this year a local, Jonathon Parker, will be attempting to break the world record for cycling across the Taklamakan Desert in North West China raising funds from sponsorship. Many other challenges are planned by members of the public in favour of the charity in 2019.

Rachel gave an excellent, professional and interesting presentation highlighting the background and operation of this local charity in entertaining Club members following the Friday lunchtime meal.

She finished her talk by describing the charity's whole team's passion to support very young children who suffer from the dreadful disease of cancer and their commitment to assist them in surviving.
