#### Speaker Reports

#### Fraser Liversage – Medical Detection Dogs

It has been known ever since dogs became "man's best friend" that they live in a world of smells. Canines have at least 60 times the number of olfactory receptors on their noses than we do and it has been shown that the part of the dogs' brain that detects smells is forty times bigger than in a human.



This, of course, has been put to good use over the generations with them being used in hunting, tracking and retrieving.

More recently is has been discovered that dogs can detect volatile organic compounds produced in patients with certain diseases and they can be trained as Assistance Dogs and also in Bio-detection.

The assistance dogs have a role in diabetes management and can detect when a patient's

diabetes may be going out of control and thus prevent a coma happening.

Bio-detection dogs may offer the innovative and exciting possibility of diagnosing diseases before there are clinical signs. Dogs have been shown to be able to detect early cancers, particularly of the bowel and bladder, before symptoms develop and to help in the diagnosis of early Parkinson's disease. They can also pick up symptomless carriers of malaria.

"taster talk" was absolutely fascinating and we are all looking forward to Fraser returning in August, to our evening meeting, when he will give us the full presentation.

#### Alan Wolstencroft - Sierra Leone Update

Alan has recently returned from his 12th trip to Sierra Leone and gave a presentation regarding the work that has been undertaken since his previous trip, last April.

There has been significant progress at the Liverpool

Community School, with the completion of the secondary school library and laboratory and the building of a junior school library room (both have been fitted with basic water harvesting systems). Both libraries have been furnished and over 1,400 text books (the first books the school has ever owned) have been purchased "in country" as a result of Alan's fundraising endeavours with support from Banbury Rotary Club and a District Grant. The first phase of laboratory equipment, the absolute essential items, have been purchased and further equipment will be added as funds permit. The school has also been provided, courtesy of Woodstock & Kidlington Rotary Club and a District Grant, with mains electricity to these 3 new rooms and 6 additional classrooms and some key areas of the school compound.

During his visit Alan officially opened 2 new classrooms at the Banbury International Community School and these have enabled Junior Secondary classes to begin at the School, something which the local community had requested. This project began in January this year and was completed in just 38 days, including all the furniture being made, at a cost of just £6,500. The progress is always amazing

given that EVERYTHING is done manually including making all the concrete blocks on site.

Alan took 6 complete sets of football shirts (4 courtesy of Oxford United & 2 courtesy of Ducklington FC) and he distributed these, along with other football equipment, to various local communities. In addition a couple of shirts courtesy of Martin @ Banbury Cricket Club, a quantity of knitted garments courtesy of a number of Inner Wheel ladies and some school stationery items were donated to local groups.

Alan also told us about the "Sunny Girl" project which he started last year. Mariamma, an 18 year old orphan that Alan supports, had told him that she is unable to afford to buy sanitary pads and therefore does not attend school during her menstrual cycle. After discussions with teachers it became obvious that this was a real problem for a lot of the girls in this impoverished community and now Alan funds, with the help of several local ladies, the project which supplies sanitary pads to 260 girls on a monthly basis. It costs just £6 a year to support a girl but to put it in perspective a junior school teacher only earns £30 a month.

During this Rotary year Alan has raised £22,000 and distributed over £28,000 for projects in the Freetown area and he continues, with a vast network of supporters to "Make A Real Difference" in Sierra Leone.



#### Update on this year's Crocus Concerts

The first of this year's Secondary School Crocus Concerts took place in March on Tuesday 12th. Sibford and Tudor Hall Schools Bloxham, entertained a small audience and on Thursday 14th Chenderit, NOA, Warriner and Wykham Park Academies played to a much larger gathering.

Both concerts were extremely well received - the performers offering a wide variety of musical styles with soloists, duettists, ensembles, orchestras and choirs amazing us with their talents. Our thanks go to all staff and students for the time and effort they have given to the preparation of these events in partnership with Rotary.

This year it was decided that 45% of the surplus would go to Polio Eradication and 45% to Helen and Douglas House Hospice with 10% for other Rotary Charities. To date the door takings have amounted to £930 and the retiring collections £175 (eligible for gift aid). Further donations from Chenderit and Tudor Hall gave almost £200 towards the causes.

The third schools' concert, involving BGN and its partner primary schools St John's and St Joseph's, originally scheduled for 21st March, will now be held on June 11th. A new venture by the Crocus/Polio Working Party is a concert involving local adult choirs. This is taking shape and is scheduled for Saturday 28th September.

Many thanks to all Rotarians who have supported this year's activities - including the planting last autumn. This year's crocus season was early - with a superb show of purple crocuses across the town from mid-February.
