# Sibford School Peace Garden



Our club were delighted to be invited to the Peace Garden opening at Sibford School on Armistice Day.

The parents of former pupil Conrad Lewis opened the garden which is designed to be a place of quiet reflection. Conrad served with the Parachute Regiment and died in Afghanistan in 2011. His parents, Tony and Sandi, laid a wreath in their son's memory following a two minute silence.

The garden is planted with 500 crocus bulbs supplied by the Rotary Club of Banbury and linked to the End Polio Now campaign which Sibford School supports. Afghanistan is one three countries where Polio is still endemic. Rotary's goal is to rid the world of Polio by 2018.

Mr Lewis said, 'We think this is absolutely right for Conrad and what has been created here is perfect for how he and other soldiers should be remembered'.

### End Polio Now



Deepak Kapur, Chairman, India National PolioPlus Committee, knows precisely when the World Health Organization officially declared India polio-free: 2:31 p.m. on March 27, 2014. He checked his watch to know "exactly when history was made," he told the Wall Street Journal.

India was a perfect home for the poliovirus: It has a huge population, poor sanitation, impure drinking water, and malnutrition. As recently as 2009, the country was home to around half of the world's cases of polio.

(Worldwide, the disease has infected more than 250 people in 2014, mostly in Pakistan.) Complicating matters, the campaign to vaccinate millions of children faced resistance among India's Muslims.

Kapur's Rotary Foundation-run committee was instrumental in convincing Muslim leaders of the virtues of vaccination, and he sees their about-face as a key ingredient in polio's eradication, alongside the use of a vaccine that targets two strains of the disease at once.

The success carries lessons for other countries where polio remains as endemic as suspicions about vaccination.

Money raised on the evening went to Cherwell Club's Charity of the year - Style Acre.

Their 50 strong choir look forward to their crocus bulbs blooming in Spring 2015 and performing in March at St Mary's, Bloxham to raise funds.

In the evening the Community and Vocational Committee confirmed arrangements for Street Organ collections and we had the first planning session to help Round Table's Christmas programme where circa 350 families / households receive food parcels. Recipients are nominated by Social Services, Sanctuary Housing, Salvation Army and Age U.K.

Another enjoyable Inner Wheel Early Bird Supper organised by Annie Phillips on 6<sup>th</sup> November.

On the 8<sup>th</sup> November DG Tim Cowling and I met Jason Ferguson of the WPSBA and Peter Williams at the Champion of Champions Snooker Tournament, Ricoh Stadium, Coventry. This was a follow up to his talk at our club when possible reciprocal support for End Polio Now and Cue Games for Schools was discussed.

Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> November was a beautiful sunny day when town service clubs joined the Banbury Remembrance Day parade and Church Service, followed by laying of wreaths at the War Memorial in Peoples' Park.



This year's Children Singing for Children concerts took place on the 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> and 13th November. Di and I thoroughly enjoyed every night's performances by 26 primary school choirs. With some monies still to be paid / received provisional figures show they raised £6,000 for our chosen charities, "One-eighty", Oxford, Sierra Leone School Projects and other Rotary Children's Charities.

On Armistice Day, 11<sup>th</sup> November, I attended the opening of the new Peace Garden at Sibford School. Meant to be a place of quiet reflection, the garden was opened by the parents of former pupil Conrad Lewis who was killed on active service in Afghanistan in 2011.

The garden has been planted with 500 Crocus Bulbs signifying the school's support of End Polio Now; Afghanistan is one of the last three countries where Polio is still endemic.



The District Interact Day on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> November held in Bourne End was a huge success. Eight Clubs and about 50 Interactors played interactive games and were treated to talks from motivational speakers including Paralympic Gold Medallist Rower, Naomi Riches and our own Alan Wolstencroft. Andrew Fairbairn demonstrated the Shelter Box disaster relief aid equipment and Aqua Filters. Great to see young people care about, and be so ready to help, others less well off than themselves.

On Friday 14<sup>th</sup> and Monday 17<sup>th</sup> Alan Wolstencroft and I had meetings in Banbury to view potential secure storage space for club property, currently held at members' homes or garages. Watch this space for a solution.

Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> saw the 2<sup>nd</sup> planning meeting for the Round Table Christmas Parcels project, with monies starting to come in from sponsors. Andrew Fairbairn has arranged for warehouse space to receive the bulk food items and make up the 350 boxes.

Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> was the delayed Foundation Committee Meeting, the main items discussed included the Family Christmas Festival of Music Concert on 13<sup>th</sup> December and an update on Crocus Concerts in March 2015.

DG Tim Cowling spoke passionately about this year's Rotary theme, 'Light Up Rotary', and the good work of clubs in District 1090 at our lunch meeting Friday 21<sup>st</sup> November.

In the evening Di and I were invited to the launch meeting of Banbury Museum's new Charitable Trust status. The museum has moved out of CDC local authority sphere and will now look to raise money itself to cover running costs, a new building for expansion and a program of travelling exhibitions.

On Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> both Banbury Rotary Clubs supported the Banbury Samaritans 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Ball at Bo Peep Farm Adderbury. An enjoyable and successful evening attended by 260 people and raising £21,500 for this much used organisation.

The fifth Council meeting of this Rotary year was held on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup>, thank you to all officers for their support so far and my amazing wife for providing sustenance.

Four of us attended the District Council meeting on 26<sup>th</sup> November at a new location, Unipart House, Cowley, Oxford. Thank you DG Tim for reducing the travel time for clubs in the north of District 1090. Main agenda items included: officer appointments for 2014/15; a proposal to decrease reserves; only 12 Clubs, (inc Banbury), in district have signed and returned compliance documents for insurance purposes the rest were asked to get do so; and the Marlow Ebola Collections which have now raised £45,000 for Monrovia.

41 members, partners and guests made a very enjoyable visit to Aylesbury theatre on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> November to see 'That'll be the Day'. A great show, thank you to Nigel Yeadon, Bob Thompson and the Sports and Entertainment Committee for organising the visit.

### Rtn Andrew McHugh - GP Burnout



On Friday 7<sup>th</sup> November 2014 Television Celebrity Rotarian Andrew McHugh gave a very interesting talk about the difficult time that some of the General Practices are going through. He said there was a 20 billion pound gap in NHS in 2008/09 and at present there is a 30 billion deficit.

He explained about the different ways the NHS could operate in delivering better outcomes for patients. The NHS had already made major savings through efficiency savings and there was no more that could be cut from the budget.

Rotarian Andrew McHugh explained about the survey he got Family Practitioners up and down the

country to do. The results were alarming, 11.6% GP's said they would be leaving in five years' time. Newly qualified Doctors were going into the field of Surgery instead of becoming a Family Practitioner. 97% of GP's said that work pressure was causing burnout.

There is a need to look for alternative ways of delivering services and getting Practice Nurses and Pharmacists to do some of treatments thus enabling Family GP's to see more patients and giving a better service.

### District Governor Tim Cowling



D.G. Tim's visit was postponed from earlier in the year due to his back injury, so it was good to see him on 21<sup>st</sup> November with almost full mobility and being very active in the role.

He spoke passionately about this year's Rotary theme by R.I. President Gary Huang, 'Light up Rotary'. Being from Taiwan, President Huang's theme has its background in the teachings of Chinese philosopher Confucius - 'Better to light one candle than sit alone and curse the darkness'.

Likening one candle to a single Rotarian's good work for local and international communities, and with 1.2 million in the family of Rotary doing good things 'Lighting up the World' becomes a stronger proposition. Our club will be applying for the Light Up Rotary District Citation by achieving the goals linked to this year's theme.

Extending the theme to 'Lighten up Rotary', Tim's message was that we need to change the image of Rotary from being 'stuffy and secret' to one of 'vibrancy, fun and good fellowship'. If that means changing long held traditions and practices then it should be considered.

Tim was assured that the family of Rotary in Banbury is in good shape with two very active, well established clubs, plus a strong Rotaract Club and Interact.

One of Tim's goals is to strengthen the family of Rotary in District 1090 through Rotaract (19 to 30 year olds), Interact (12 to 18's) and Rotakids (8 to 11 years). A very successful meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> November saw 50 Interactors from 8 clubs take part in an exciting programme that included: workshops; interactive games and presentations; including Paralympic gold medallist Naomi Riches and our own Alan Wolstencroft.

He said how uplifting it is to see young people working to improve the lives of others.

Tim chose his charity for this year 'See Saw', (helps bereaved young children), because his own mother died in his infancy. His idea was to take part in a number of fun runs throughout the year and be sponsored to raise funds for the charity. After his accident a volunteer stepped forward and has already completed 5 runs with a further three scheduled, he hopes to raise about £4,000 for 'See Saw' this year.

Planning for the District conference in Telford next March is well advanced, speakers are finalised and the fellowship events look exciting. Banbury has 26 people booked to go and there are still opportunities for others to attend.

Following his recovery from the accident, Tim is enjoying his year especially his visits to clubs and now has just a few more to do to complete all the clubs in District 1090.

Tim was praised for his excellent leadership of District 1090 by President Phil and thanked by the club for his visit and talk.

Nigel Deakin – 20 years of the Beacon Centre



At our meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> November Nigel Deakin thanked everyone for the welcome he'd received and began by explaining that the Beacon is available for people who are homeless, who are poorly housed, who feel marginalised, who are disadvantaged, who have mental health problems and who have substance abuse problems.

Nigel summarised the main role of the Centre as helping ensure that each visitor felt "welcomed, valued and appreciated as a human being". He paid tribute to the volunteers and supporters of the Centre, all of whom work together to keep the Centre open four mornings a week throughout the year.

The Beacon had begun in a temporary hut in 1994 behind Iceland in Calthorpe Street. It had moved to Wood Green Centre for a year before settling in its current home in 2000 - renting St Mary's Centre from St Mary's Church at a reduced rate.

It has received a grant of £1,3000 annually from Cherwell District Council, which equates to some 75% of its running costs. With local authority budgets under pressure, the grant, like many others, is not guaranteed to continue. Charitable donations make up the rest of the Centre's income.

Those visiting the Centre may do so for various reasons. "It's so important to have places where people can come together", Nigel stressed. "The Beacon Centre is a meeting place. People need to find some sense of being valued. We're not just judging what they need. We're all in this together - we're social beings".


Nigel thanked those individuals, churches and community service groups who had raised over £4,000 in total during the month of October marking the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Beacon Centre's service.

In answer to questions, he explained some visitors come because of relationship breakdowns or loss of a job. Rules are kept to a minimum. People are asked to keep within the bounds of acceptable behaviour. Drink and drugs are not allowed. The sanction is to exclude for a given period.

Family mediation and support with mental health/ substance abuse problems are available. Nigel felt there would always be a need for provision such as the Beacon. The strength is that the provision continues to be there. Visitors can go away and come back. For many "it's the family they haven't got."

# Around the Committees

### President's Business

Storage - Andrew McHugh has kindly offered the use of a storage room at the South Bar House Surgery building for Club property, archives and printed materials. The room is lockable, approx 18ft x 8ft x 6ft, and dry. Access to the room would be Monday to Friday between 9.00 am and 6.00 pm. and would need to be booked and accompanied as the basement is also used to store confidential medical records. Council agreed to accept Andrews offer, P.C. to arrange letter of agreement, Paul G to arrange for an itinerary of items and a booking system. We were considering buying a container and this will save the club £1,500 to £2,000.

Round Table - Christmas Food Hampers Parcels project progressing, £4,700 committed from sponsors and Round Table. Warehousing space sourced, encase supplying cartons, Modelez and Fine Lady providing items for the parcels, bulk items to be purchased from Tesco.

Sanctuary Housing have provided a list of 200 recipients, further lists awaited from Salvation Army, Age U.K. and Social Services. Receiving and packing planned for 8<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> December with home deliveries to an expected 350 addresses on 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>.

Contact Club - David Hitchcox has circulated a board for an interest meeting to be held pre-Christmas. John Hansford will be away next May but offered to support the planning group. DH to ask if Martin Phillips and John Bennett will help.

Revisions to RIBI Structure - The proposed revisions to RIBI were discussed, even though our members do not have recent first-hand experience of working with or in RIBI, it did spark lively debate.

The main questions raised were;-

- Should an organisation review itself, are there too many vested interests to be impartial?
- Has the question been answered is RIBI necessary? Can they clarify what value is added to Districts and Clubs that is not provided by R.I. (this would help fend off criticism from the ranks).

Assuming answers to the above are clear it was felt that:-

- Making the infrastructure more simple and relating it to Districts and Clubs can only be good.
- Focus on raising profile and awareness of Rotary in Britain is great. A high profile patron would be desirable but it was mentioned that RIBI itself is not a charity.
- The proposed changes in themselves have no adverse effect on clubs, which is good.


