The Classification, Membership and PR Committee under John Smith's chairmanship covers a range of our interests with Maurice doing a more than conscientious job as Welfare Officer, Simon looking for PR opportunities, and Tony maintaining attendance records.

Sadly, we have lost three of our elder statesmen this year, namely Charles Swain, David Barlow and Tom Taylor all of whom we miss but remember fondly. Also Gilbert Csecs, Brian Gardner, Peggy Williams and Colin Clarke each decided that they are too busy elsewhere to stay as members. So, it's time to invite more to join us, as Charles has done today.

The judgement exercised by our Community and Vocational Committee as to which causes to support is crucial to our effectiveness.

One of their recent activities, organised by Helen Braisby and enjoyed by attendees, was our party for the visually impaired, using Malcolm Dibb's excellent catering and Gareth's fine musicians not forgetting our in-house comedy trio.

This Committee, chaired by Simon Bion, also organises our Christmas street organ collections and

the time put in by Andrew Fairbairn and John Webb at the machines and Alan banking was outstanding. Christmas was busy for many, particularly those collecting food from Sainsburys and making up and distributing parcels to the needy. Some also took the Round Table Christmas Float to a few villages, but the enjoyable Service Clubs Carol Service really started the season for me.



Foundation is our Rotary charity and that committee, under Ron's chairmanship, aims to raise at least \$100 per member each year by various means including that fun event, Stephen's Summer Steaming.

The Committee also drives our End Polio Now campaign and it is impressive how those organising this, particularly Fred and John Bennett, have involved local schools for crocus planting and concerts. Although we cancelled our crocus concerts this year, Sibford School continued with theirs and kindly gave us the money raised.



Talking of schools, it is good that Ian Anthistle and John Bennett's efforts have increased the interest in Interact at BGN.

I also thank Martin and Annie for taking care of a more mature student, our Rotary Scholar, Zali Fung from Australia.

At the last Handover I highlighted the Rotary International President's theme "Be a Gift to the World". Through your efforts, we have given over £30,000 to various causes, including:

• £7,750 to Katharine House Hospice;

- £5,750 to Foundation;
- £2,000 to the End Polio Now Campaign;
- £3,000 to Frank Wise School;
- £3,000 to engineering students via the Brodey Bursary;
- £1,500 to Hope & Homes for Children;
- £1,050 to Style Acre;
- £1,500 towards Alan's Sierra Leone schools project. We also helped to transfer almost £25,000 raised by Alan for his projects;
- £500 raised by Andrew's Wolf Run for Air Ambulance; and
- over £2,000 to Shelter from Andrew's and my Tour de Trigs sponsorship.

I think we have complied well with the RI President's theme.

Events are successful through the efforts of our project leaders and their supporting teams, an example being "Children Singing for Children" concerts.

Earlier I named only the leaders for that event but they are backed by others and we should not underestimate the importance of those dealing with finer details such as lan organising stewards, Ron creating projector displays, and others on cash desks, etc.

Mother Teresa put our individual efforts into perspective when she said "Most of us can do, not great things, only small things but with great love".

We think sometimes that our individual efforts are too small to be significant. However, if you think that small cannot be effective, try sharing a bed for the night with a mosquito!

I have been asked if I am enjoying my year as President. The answer was quite simply "Yes" and I thank you for helping me to do so. I am also asked about highlights and lowlights. That is more difficult to answer.

There have been a number of highlights such as the 80th Anniversary Dinner, the "Children Singing for Children" concerts and the Young Musician and Young Chef competitions. Working with young people is rewarding, even planting crocus bulbs in the rain.

The Contact Club visit to France was definitely a highlight but, as you know I enjoy my food and wine. Of course the fellowship and fun there was great too, particularly as our singing prowess shone with our versions of "Bring Me Sunshine" and "Yellow Submarine". I was tempted to ask our choir, if that is the correct description, to perform again today but the temptation soon waned you will be pleased to know.

Lowlights? - well I can't think of anything serious.

If I am honest, my not completing the full 50 miles of the Tour de Trigs was a disappointment but few entrants did thanks to Storm Desmond and for me there were highlights, one that, at nearly 40 miles, I had walked further than ever before and in far worse conditions.

Another was recognising that whoever up there looks after me stepped in and sent a doctor to walk with me, diagnose hypoxia and insist on my stopping otherwise I would have tried to continue, possibly resulting in long term damage.

Here, I not only congratulate Andrew on making the full 50 miles but I also thank him for walking many hours with me beforehand to build my physical and mental stamina to the level required. In addition to funds raised through the Club mentioned earlier, we raised £1,250 on the internet making our total over £3,300 for Shelter, which made it all worthwhile.

Of course, one person I really do need to thank is here as my guest. Pat has worked hard to support me, has always been on hand to help, and she has refused me nothing that I have ever requested!

I am now "Yesterday's Man". Next week Owen will take over for what promises to be a good year for the Club. Please remember that he is not retired like me but works full time and will need your total support.

Again, I thank you for your support of me over the past year. It has gone by quickly. So, with apologies to our resident poet Tony, but, as Dr. Seuss said:

Speaker Reports

Lucy Wise – See Saw



Grief support for children and young people in Oxfordshire

On 3 June, Club were addressed by Lucy Wise, a recent recruit to the staff at SeeSaw who gave an excellent talk with sensitivity and commitment. She was joined later by Carol Humphris to assist in answering any specific questions relating to Banbury activities.

What is SeeSaw?

A charity providing grief support for children and young people, (up to the age of 18), in Oxfordshire.

A major bereavement is hard enough for an adult to cope with, but it can be extremely frightening and confusing for a child:

- they feel exactly the same sadness, anger and pain as adults, but find it harder to understand and navigate their way through their many different emotions;
- the people best placed to support them, their family, are themselves grieving;
- their friends, who may have no experience of death, cannot fully understand what they are going through.

About a third of bereaved children experience real difficulties. This can happen in some cases where the death of a loved one was unexpected or particularly traumatic, such as accident, murder or suicide.

One child might go 'off the rails', while another might withdraw and hardly speak. Without expert support at this critical time, these children can face serious emotional problems in later life.

SeeSaw works with about 450 children each year, usually following the death of a parent, but also if a brother or sister dies, close friend or grandparent.

Bereavement Statistics

Around 200 parents die in the area each year, leaving around 350 dependent children up to the age of 17.

It is estimated that the current school age population of children and young people (aged 5 to 16) in this area who have been bereaved of a parent or sibling at some point in their childhood is around 2,250.

Considering these figures, the need for SeeSaw is evident.

The SeeSaw Team

The charity has 10 Trustees, all of whom are volunteers, their role is to ensure financial sustainability and adherence to its principles and aims.

There are 4 clinical staff members and the same number in the office team.

12 highly skilled and trained volunteer support workers to deliver grief support where required.

Additionally, volunteers support office work, fundraising events and act as ambassadors for talks to community groups

Overview of Services

• One to one support: including telephone advice for parents and carers and face to face work with children. Volunteers provide much of this work across the county.

- Schools support service: training for teachers on how to support a bereaved child. Also a rapid response support in cases where there has been a sudden death of a pupil under the age of 18.
- Pre-bereavement work: work with families where a parent or sibling is known to be dying.
- Training for professionals: specialist training and consultation with a range of agencies including health and social care, police and more.
- Side by side activity days: to bring together young people and families in a variety of ways to provide therapeutic support and reduce the sense of isolation

All SeeSaw's services are free of charge and they don't have a waiting list.

Following feedback from two youth forums they are now developing online support.

The Financials

Currently for just under £310,000 a year, SeeSaw is able to provide a comprehensive service to the whole of Oxfordshire, Just 15% of this income is from committed grants the rest depends upon their own fund-raising efforts.


