Events

Visits to Ardley Energy Recovery Waste Facility



On Monday 31st October and on Thursday 3rd November groups of Banbury Rotarians visited this multimillion pound operation. It is run by Viridor a privately funded enterprise that deals with all the Oxfordshire non-hazardous waste put in the green wheelie bins. In the past this would have gone into land fill sites incurring 'land fill tax' whereas now a smaller fee is paid to Viridor saving us ratepayers something around 5 million pounds a year. Land is not wasted, Oxfordshire residents are saved money, AND Viridor makes a profit, so it is a 'win win' situation.

The waste material is mixed, dried then burnt and the heat is used to drive a turbine generating electricity which is sold to the National Grid. Whilst surplus heat is cooled and dissipates into the atmosphere, in future it is hoped to be able to pipe this to nearby housing estates or businesses.

Burnt waste is sorted to remove metals and the remainder is stored for six weeks whilst chemical and other checks are carried out prior to being sent off for road building and the formation of items such as building blocks.

Sylvie Verinder the Visitor Centre manager was clearly well qualified in all aspects of waste disposal, she was enthusiastic, knowledgeable and a credit to her employers; she showed the Monday party around and her colleague Jessica Baker-Pike was in attendance during the Thursday.

The feedback from those who attended has been excellent.

The TV studio is totally glass fronted floor to ceiling which from the arena makes the commentary team look as if they are inside a goldfish bowl!

The event was broadcast live which meant that after each frame there was an advertising break and play could not recommence until the signal was given for the end of the adverts and a return to the live broadcast. Funny how the knowledge that you might be seen live on TV makes your nose itch uncontrollably!

Speaker Reports

Peter Barwell – Who is Peter Barwell from No. 108?



We were pleased to welcome Peter Barwell, former Lord Mayor of Birmingham, as our speaker at our meeting on 4th November 2016. Peter gave us a fascinating talk, covering his life in the printing business, and his time as Lord Mayor including bringing the Birmingham Superprix motor race to the streets of the City. Peter now lives in Bloxham

and works as part on the management team running Bloxham Museum.

Sierra Leone Update

Alan gave us an update regarding his latest visit to Freetown in October explaining that when he first went in 2005 it was for a "one off life experience" but it was a life changing trip and his recent trip was his tenth visit to the country.

Alan started by giving an overview of what Banbury Rotary have supported over the last 10 years at 3 schools that Alan is working with. This includes building and equipping 22 classrooms, 3 toilet blocks, an open plan multi-purpose hall, a library, 3 staff room/offices, a recreation area and a security wall around one of the school compounds. In addition 15 classrooms, a toilet block and a well have all been refurbished.

Alan went on to explain that a year ago he started supporting a fourth school and has funded the building and equipping of 2 classrooms and a toilet block and has installed water harvesting at the school. Whilst in Freetown he agreed to develop the school further, as they have increased the number of children from 85 to 123, and a second 2 classroom block incorporating an office, staff room and store is now under way.

Everything on site is done manually, including making all the concrete blocks, and the builders are all from the local community as this gives the community a sense of ownership of the project. Once completed this block will also have a water harvesting system installed and a handwash station will be created at the toilet block using basic rainwater harvesting.

It currently costs £10 per term for a child to attend the school and they have recently introduced a school uniform which costs £10 including a pair of shoes. Alan has received sponsorship from an anonymous donor who has underwritten the cost of providing school uniform for children if their parents are unable to buy one.

Alan explained that following a recent meeting held by the school community it was decided to re-name the school 'The Banbury International Community School' in recognition of the support from the Banbury area. Alan concluded by thanking the Club, individuals within the Club and District and members of the local community for helping him continue to "make a real difference" to the communities in Sierra Leone.

The club were very appreciative of his efforts and thanked him for an extremely interesting and informative chat.
