Speaker Reports

Greg Smith – Victim Initiative Restorative Justice

Victims of crime can be left feeling frightened, anxious or suffer a loss of confidence. It is good to know that the police have taken action and that the perpetrator has received a suitable sentence through the magistrate or higher court, but sometimes this just isn't enough. A voice at the

centre of things, the ability to ask questions, not feeling like an observer have all helped victims to feel better and to move on. The Restorative Justice Service can help you know that the person who committed a crime against you understands how it has affected you.



Restorative Justice (RJ) is funded by the Police Crime Commissioner to deliver victim initiated restorative justice in Thames Valley. They work closely with police and victim support to identify victims of crime, but are not reaching enough people. The take up rate for RJ is fairly low, but the England Wales Crime Survey and a recent Mori poll suggests that this is because victims of crime don't know about RJ, but would use it if they did. The RJ Service is therefore looking for new ways to contact people directly and generally raise awareness, and Greg used this opportunity to spread the word through Rotary members.

Restorative Justice (RJ) aims to bring those harmed by crime, and those responsible for the harm, into communication, enabling everyone affected by a particular incident - victim, offender, their family or friends, and the wider community - to play a part in repairing the harm and finding a positive way forward. For victims, their harm or loss can be acknowledged, their questions answered and some amends made if that is what they wish. Offenders have the opportunity to take responsibility, acknowledge the impact of their actions and to make reparation. There is a very high satisfaction rate for victims going through this process and a marked reduction in reoffending for the perpetrators.

Do get in touch with Thames Valley Restorative Justice if the moment is right for you: restorative justice could be the key to help you move on. A trained facilitator will explore the options, guided

by your needs and wishes. If you would like to find out more, please get in touch. All information shared will be treated in the strictest confidence.

Martin Phillips – Longer Serving Member



Martin Phillips has been in Rotary for 25 years and has thoroughly enjoyed it having followed in his father's footsteps.

He took us through his life story in his usual humorous vein. He described his two grandfathers, one in industry in the Birmingham area and the other in farming in the West Country. His paternal grandfather led to his father starting Swan Foundry which of course Martin runs today.

Martin's early education at Sibford School was not a huge academic success but he subsequently attended a college to obtain his foundry qualifications. He worked for his father before eventually taking over the running of the business and he now has two sons working for him.

He was an enthusiastic member of Rotaract and made many friends through this organisation including Annie his wife. His social life, apart from Rotaract and Rotary, has been very much tied up in sport playing cricket for Banbury and rugby also for Banbury. He continues to be active for the cricket club as chairman for a number of years.

Martin went on to describe some of the castings Swan Foundry make and he brought some samples. He told us how they tended to make specialised

castings in relatively small quantities rather than mass production which many businesses make for themselves. Swan is one of very few iron foundries which have survived various business downturns.

In reply to a question about Brexit he said that the drop in the value of sterling had given some of his customers a boost as their products were cheaper to export hence his business had been better.

Judith Diment – End Polio Now Update

Friday 27th January was the anniversary of the death of our founder Paul Harris, and as we have done for many years, we held our annual frugal lunch whereby all members who attended made a £6 gift aided donation to Foundation.

This year's event was made exceptionally special by us having the great pleasure and privilege of having Judith Diment as our guest speaker. Judith is heavily involved in the End Polio Now campaign on an international level.



Judith refreshed our minds on the origins of, and progress achieved by, the campaign over the past 30 years. She reminded us that 30 years ago, polio was endemic in most of the world, and paralyzed more than 1,000 children worldwide every day, or about 350,000 children a year, and that since then, more than 2.5 billion children have been immunized against polio thanks to the incredible work of Rotary and all its partners. The effort has spanned more than 200 countries, relying on 20 million volunteers and the backing of an international investment of more than \$11 billion of which Rotary is the main private sector donor having contributed more than \$ 1.6 billion.

We have reduced polio cases worldwide by 99.9%, and a polio-free world is in sight, with only two polio-endemic countries remaining. Polio is now on the brink of eradication, with a total of 32 wild polio cases reported in 2016, compared with 56 in 2015.

She also gave us the excellent news that in the 12 weeks prior to the meeting there had been no new cases of Polio reported worldwide.

Judith gave us a fascinating insight into the work being carried out by the international eradication team, of which Rotary is a major player, and emphasised that whilst the end may be in sight:

- Now is not the time to talk about polio fatigue;
- Now is not the time to stop fund raising; and
- Now we need to stay the course and continue to do all that we can to ensure that we declare victory and celebrate zero cases of polio.

End polio - make history and honour Rotary's promise to the children of the world.

I arrived back to Australia yesterday, and I am delighted to be starting a new job as a Policy Officer with the Office of Environment and Heritage NSW in mid-February.

How are you both and what have you got planned for 2017? I am still trying to arrange to return to Oxford for my graduation this year, but they have been pathetic at replying so far. Let me know if you have any plans for coming to Australia.

And last but not least, thank you for everything that you did for me through my year at Oxford. I just completed the Rotary Final Report and it gave me time to reflect on the year, and how fortunate I was to always have you both there if I ever needed help, from providing me with a good meal during times of intense study and stress to offering me a place to be over Christmas.
