Children Singing for Children

A resounding success! The four concerts once again surpassed our expectations. That annual spine-tingling finale was matched this year by the individual school performances, which get better every year and - a record amount was raised.

This year 26 schools took part and in total, there were around 650 children in the choirs. The total raised for the chosen charities was £7,500. 30% will go to the Helen House unit at Helen & Douglas

House, a hospice providing palliative, respite and end of life care for young children, a further 30% to Banbury Rotary Club's Sierra Leone Schools Projects and 30% to Rotary's End Polio Now campaign. The remaining 10% will go to other Rotary Children's Charities in the period up to June 30th 2018.



There is a bonus with two of the charities we are supporting. The Sierra Leone project will receive £2,250 which turns into £4,500 as a result of Barclays Bank's matched funding for this project. This money will pay for the cost of building & equipping a new classroom at the Banbury International School.

Rotary's Charity to bring about the eradication of polio, *Purple4Polio*, will also receive £2,250 which becomes £6,750 as a result of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation double-matched funding for this charity. This funding is sufficient to immunise around 12,000 children - close to the total number of children in Banbury area primary, secondary and special schools. We are winning the battle!

This means that the total being received by the three nominated charities and other children's charities will be just over £14,000. This is an incredible amount about which the children and staff involved, our conductors, piano and percussion accompanists, St Mary's volunteers, the event sponsors, our advertisers, the Rotary Working Group and Stewarding Team, and our Club as a whole should be justifiably proud.

The concerts were run in association with the new Arts and Events team at St Mary's Church. They were sponsored by Tudor Hall and Carrdus Schools with additional support from Banbury Charities and Barclays Bank, Banbury.

Banbury Rotary Club's Efforts to End Polio continue



As members will know, the work of Banbury Rotary Club was acknowledged in a recent Newsletter from Rotary in Britain and Ireland as part of an article on contributions to the End Polio Now campaign.

The Rotary International President had set Clubs across the world a target of donating \$2,650 to the campaign. Not only did Banbury Rotary Club come top of the 60 Clubs in the Thames Valley District, with a total of \$10,168 donated it was listed 4th in the Rotary organisation in Britain & Ireland. With the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation double-matching commitment, this \$10,168 became \$30,504 which went direct to the effort to finally eradicate polio from the planet.

The Club's Purple for Polio working party, which drove the club's programme forward last year, is particularly grateful to the Banbury Guardian for its coverage of crocus corm planting in autumn 2016 and the Crocus Concerts in early March this year. The concerts generated a significant proportion of the funds, at the same time raising the profile of Rotary's involvement with the End Polio Now campaign by involving ALL EIGHT local secondary schools. The planting of over 47,000 crocus corms and the donation of crocus packs to local primary schools also gave a great deal of positive publicity to the campaign which translated itself into the support allowing us to make such a significant contribution.

The Club is certainly not resting on its laurels. We sent £2,000 as our first contribution to End Polio Now for the current Rotary Year 2017/18, following the highly successful "Night at the Musicals" concert with West End Stars appearing and donating their talents free for the cause. In addition, our "Children Singing for Children" Concerts last month raised a further £2500 for the cause.

For the past four years, Cherwell District Council, Banbury Town Council and an increasing number of local community groups, churches and individuals have supported the partnership between Rotary and local secondary schools begun in autumn 2013. The internationally agreed target to eradicate polio by 2018 will not quite be achieved, but there is still hope that the very last case of the wild polio virus may occur in 2018. There have been just 12 new cases in 2017.

Ron Barnett continues to lead the “Crocus Packs for Primary Schools” Project and we are involving eight schools planting the packs this year. A small team of Rotarians led by Harry Matthews gathered to plant 15,000 crocus corms provided by Cherwell District Council on Broughton Road Roundabout and North Oxfordshire Academy’s Horticultural Club students planted 5000 corms provided by Banbury Town Council in St Mary’s Churchyard again under Harry’s guidance, this time with the Park Ranger Team support.

This year’s additional wheeze is our “PickupaPurple4PolioPen4aPound!” Three schools have already committed to purchase 550 of the 1,000 pens we ordered from Chilli Promotions.

The 2018 Purple4Polio Crocus Concerts will take place in St Mary’s Church on Tuesday 6th and Thursday 8th March - both starting at 7pm.

Council Notes

The International committee “Rotary’s got Talent” Evening raised £718. The Gur Assra Trust in Mohali in India benefitted by £646.20 after deduction for Free Funds. This money was delivered personally by Rtn. Surinder Dhesi to the orphanage on her recent visit and it was very gratefully received.

More offers of fundraising projects were received to assist the Young Carers visit to CERN.

The proposed Reading Buddies Scheme at Hill View School is being supported by 3 of our members.

In cooperation with St Mary’s & St Hugh’s Churches, the Club has almost finished furnishing 2 bedrooms at the home of the Syrian Refugees arriving in Banbury during early December.

£100 of food vouchers were approved for Polly Preedy’s good works.

Christmas parcels. Good progress with this project, more sponsorship has been received. Tables have

been arranged to facilitate the packing of some 283 required parcels. Boards for volunteers for delivery and packing to be circulated at Club Lunches.

Free Funds stand at £2,083.76.

The Club Christmas Lunch on 15th December is well supported and will be addressed by Sir Tony Baldry.

Plans for Contact 2019 are progressing well with visits to Oxford and Gaydon Motor Museum being investigated.
