



Andrew Fairbairn hosted Peter and gave the vote of thanks.




Andrew Bilski comes from Australia living in Canberra with a population of 300,000. He is fluent in French, Mandarin and of course English. This is because of his upbringing in a mixed family background. After his early education he went on to Law School in Sydney and achieved B.A. I n Law & Finance. He is currently studying for a masters in International Environmental Governance at Christ Church Oxford. His first

contact with Rotary was at 17 taking part in a Rotary Citizenship Programme. His hobbies include cricket !! but his expertise is in wrestling in which he wrestles to International Standard and hopes to be included in the Australian team for the 2012 Olympics. On his return to Australia he hopes to encourage local people to be involved with Rotary.

- 20 local primary school choirs and around 450 pupils took part in the Banbury Rotary Club 'Children Singing for Children' concerts this year.
- The charities being supported are Helen & Douglas House, BeKind, Frank Wise School and other Rotary Children's Charities. This year the concerts generated over £3,000 for local and international In the early 1980s Jeremy Rowe, Val Scarff and Tony Keen worked with Banbury Lions to stage a series of Christmas Concerts at St Mary's church called 'Children Singing for Children'. With St Mary's refurbished, the three originators of the series staged a highly successful comeback with two 'One World Theme' concerts in 2002. The concerts have proved very popular and have become an annual event on the Town Calendar, with an increasing number of schools taking part each year. In total around £35,000 has been raised for local and international children's charities.

Now in the ninth year of the new series, Tony Keen will again provide the percussion accompaniment to the finale items. Jonathan Clarke, musical director of St Mary's is our piano accompanist and our guest conductor for the fifth year running is Assistant Head of Oxfordshire Music Advisory Services, Liz Stock. Over the three nights, choirs from 20 local primary schools sang songs from around the world on a 'one world' theme. Participants from 'Banbury Young Musician of the Year' and local oboist Corinne Ellul also performed.

Approximately 130 children sang at every concert and following individual items by each school, the massed choirs joined together for the finale.

SPEAKER REPORTS.

Greenland on Skis

Greenland is the largest island in the world but, with only circa 56,000 inhabitants, the least densely populated. In excess of 80% of it is covered by an ice sheet. Inland is a barren wasteland, void of settlements, roads and is home to freezing temperatures. Yet in the spirit of adventure, a few intrepid explorers are attracted each year by the opportunity to test their individual mettle, stamina and team skills in a beautiful though hostile and unforgiving environment more suited to its resident polar bears.

Peter Talbot is from South Shields and Sunderland supporter. Unperturbed by our Geordie's reference to the recent 5-1 trouncing in the Premier League, he proceeded to describe in an understated manner how he, together with a small group of colleagues, coped with a few minor (!) difficulties:

- the need to create a 300 metre runway in soft snow conditions to enable their tenuous link with the outside world, a small plane, to land and take off;
- practising and honing their survival techniques to cope with crevasses and cornices amongst other hazards;
- planning for a lack of time. Everything takes longer including the basic essentials e.g. two hours each day to melt ice so that they could drink;
- navigation by aerial photographs (no maps);
- travelling in white-outs; and
- sleeping when the sun never sets.



Not only was there much about the expedition to capture and hold the attention of club members, but Peter also used the occasion to enhance the prominence of the charity, Prostate UK. This is the most virulent form of cancer in men in the UK and is the cause of 10,000 deaths in men every year. 50% of the male population will suffer from some form of Prostate disease at some stage of their life. A convenient business card sized free leaflet was given to every member incorporating straightforward, simple plain advice. Peter travels the country giving his time free of charge to articulate the danger of procrastination, the least we can do is to display our very grateful appreciation for a most entertaining presentation by taking heed.
