# December the 13th was an auspicious day for Dogs For The Disabled.

The President of the Rotary Club of Banbury, Ron Barnett presented a cheque for £4,750.00 to enable the training of three dogs which when trained will assist disabled people in their daily lives also a 10 year programme for the upkeep of a fully trained dog. The money was part of a legacy given in remembrance of the late Rotarian Bob Dix who died in 2009.

Because of his love of dogs and always having one as a pet it was felt by the Rotary club that this would be a fitting tribute to him.

The sponsorship allows the club to receive regular updates of the dogs training and to know and have contact with the eventual owner of these assistance dogs.

The initial training is given by volunteers who have the dogs for the first year of their lives, they then go to full time training at the "Dogs for the Disabled" site on the Middleton Road, Banbury. They are then matched with a disabled person who are also given training together, before taking up their lives in a partnership. The three sponsored puppies in attendance at the presentation were Sonic, Kymba and Major with their volunteer trainers Fran Brookfield from Fritwell, Tony Gow from Coventry and Clare Bassett from Daventry.

A 10 year sponsorship was also financed this is for a fully trained dog Max with his owner Sue Harvey from Thame.

#### SPEAKER REPORT.

On Friday 10<sup>th</sup>. December our speaker was Prim Herridge a Modern Languages teacher from Blessed George Napier School, Banbury

Her Subject was The Tall Ships Experience.

In April 2010 the club received a request for financial support from a member of staff at Blessed George Napier School. At that time a decision had been made to invite 22 year 11 students to spend a week as part of an integrated crew on two wind powered sailing ships in the Solent off the South Coast – a wonderful and exciting character building opportunity for the young people.

The overall costs were in excess of £9,000 and the staff team were very keen to offer places to those who matched one of the following criteria:

- Individuals lacking in confidence
- Those who had worked particularly hard in their studies despite a variety of domestic challenges
- Individuals who were known to have a poor home life

As a number of those fitting these criteria were unlikely to be able to cover the full cost of the trip there was a need for the school to raise substantial funds to reduce the expense to the individual.

The Rotary Club of Banbury donated £500 to the costs from Club Trust Funds

#### The Trip

Prim proved to be an entertaining and seasoned speaker who brought with her photographs taken of the students taken during the week's exercises.

Initially she outlined details of the tremendous effort made by members of the school staff and the students to raise further funds to ensure that all of those selected were able to join the team whatever their financialVdomestic circumstances. These included operating a tuck shop, organising raffles, car washing and other sponsored events the most popular of which was shown in Prim's photograph presentation – dowsing one of the teachers with buckets of water!

Despite the disappointment of finding that two committed commercial sponsors withdrew 'at the last minute' the students and the school were able to raise some 50% of the overall costs from their efforts.

Prim provided a range of photographs of the team enjoying their experience in 'crewing' the sailing ships in the Solent, without incident, during a week of fine weather last July. Awards were made to students

excelling during the trip and these were dedicated to the name of a member of staff who was heavily in the planning and arrangements but sadly died before the trip took place.

The main aim was to develop personal skills in a challenging and memorable sail training environment. All of the students involved were able to gain experience of working in a team and taking personal responsibility for important tasks thereby increasing their levels of self esteem, self confidence and self reliance

In thanking the Rotary Club for the financial support provided Prim highlighted the success of the trip for the individual students the determination of the staff team at BGN to provide similar character building opportunities in 2011.

A vote of thanks was given by Rotarian Bernard Goodchild.
