It's been a few weeks since my last Newsletter and I am sure you are ALL dying to hear more information about the work of GAGA – so here it is:

**Ithembalihle, Kwa Zulu Natal, South Africa** – a small orphanage for 18 children (aged 18 months to 17 years) run by a lady called Thandiwe who has built a small house and a church hall in the rural community. All the girls sleep in the house whilst the boys sleep in the church hall – there are no beds they all sleep on mattresses on the floor. GAGA has agreed to underwrite the funding of another building so that the children can have proper rooms to sleep in and hopefully **REAL** beds. In late September myself and 6 others will be going out for 2 weeks to work alongside local tradesmen to construct the building. When we get there the foundations will be complete and **ALL** we have to do is build the walls and get the roof on!!

## **Rotary has the bottle to help End Polio Now**

"The Rotary year 2011/12 will be the final year when we are asked to meet Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, which we aim to complete by 30 June 2012. The Rotary Tomato Sauce (End Polio Now) initiative was conceived as a way for Rotarians and clubs to raise funds to help meet the challenge.

A number of Rotarians and clubs have asked if they can utilise the Rotary Tomato Sauce initiative to support Rotary Foundation giving or support other charities – the answer is of course yes. This is an excellent way of promoting Rotary and raising funds to save and change lives." Vice President Ray Burman

Here is a 'saucy' new idea to help End Polio Now.

**Pick up a bottle of, or donate a pound for, this special tomato ketchup and use it for family events and social activities, such as 'meet the club' days and barbecue fundraisers. When the bottle is empty, just clean it out and fill it with change, Gift Aid it and hand it in.**

Over 50,000 bottles of tomato ketchup have been sent around to all Rotary districts in these islands, thanks to the extreme generosity of Wilkin & Sons in Tiptree, Essex, which is partnering, once more, with Rotary International in Great Britain & Ireland (RIBI) for another innovative fundraiser. The company previously helped with a marmalade initiative in 2003 when over \$1m was raised for The Rotary Foundation. If every bottle generates a £1 donation and is then filled with £5 of change, you could help raise over £300,000. This could buy over a million doses of the polio vaccine and save children in the four remaining endemic countries from his crippling and painful disease.

It is a really simple way to save hundreds of thousands of young lives and means everyone can support the incredible drive to eradicate polio for good. Since 1985, Rotary clubs all over the world have been committed to eradicating polio. From hundreds of thousands of new cases every year, there are now barely a thousand. There were 125 endemic countries, now there are just four: Afghanistan, Pakistan, India and Nigeria. President Elect John Bennett will be distributing the bottles soon.

### **Speaker Reports.**

On May 6th Nigel Deakin spoke about The Beacon Centre - how it was formed and the community it serves.

Starting in a portacabin in 1994 it was hit and miss whether it would succeed. As numbers of those in need increased they moved to Woodgreen in 1999, finally now at St Mary's Centre.

The centre is open Monday to Thursday from 10a.m. until midday, welcoming visitors with various problems - ranging from homelessness and isolation through to drink, drugs and mental health issues. Games and other social activities are also provided.

As well as offering practical help from various agencies eg housing, benefits, the clients are able to support each other - giving self help and made to feel valued as a person not someone who is

"labelled". There are a lot of "lost causes" but the centre helps anyone "back on their feet". Any of these problems could happen to any one of us. One client expressed the sentiment that the centre is a haven of peace and tranquillity.

Volunteers are on hand to serve free drinks and snacks to the visitors. Many Rotarians and their wives help in various ways along with BYHP and other agencies.

All these services come at a cost - approx £22,000 a year. Funding is a problem, grants have been received from Cherwell and local churches, but losses have been incurred over the last 2 years.

Members of our club are cordially invited to call in and see for themselves the support that is given to visitors.

## **Micro Credit in Malawi**

### **Rtn. Alan French – Rotary Club of Burnham Beeches**

Alan paid a second visit to our club to talk to us about the initiative they have been supporting for a number of years funding Micro-Credit in Malawi.

Malawi is situated in Southern Africa between Mozambique and South Africa. It is amongst the 20 poorest countries in the world, and is 85% agricultural based, with 65% of its population with no access to banking. The micro-credit project seeks to redress this by making small, relatively short term loans to individuals to allow them to set up their own business enterprises and become self-sufficient. This is now a well proven model and is really effective in empowering people to help themselves rather than giving hand outs. Loans are used to fund a diverse range of business enterprises ranging from tomato growing, through baking to a school.

A typical loan will have a positive impact in helping up to 7 people over a 4 month period, with the maximum loan terms generally being 16 months. When the loan is repaid, it is relent, recycling the benefit and helping another group of people.

The bakery project which Alan detailed to us now employs 42 people so the beneficial impacts are far reaching.

Further the project helps to operate mobile banks giving access to banking services to people in rural areas. There is local Rotary support and a rigorous checking process to ensure the money is going where it should and being applied for its intended purpose.

As stated this is a well proven model and as a result Burnham Beeches have been raising in the region of £20,000 a year to support it.

Alan presented the benefits of the scheme very comprehensively, and we are particularly grateful to him for taking the time to come and speak to us during his Presidential year which must be extremely busy for him.
