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HAITI DISASTER APPEAL BANBURY ROTARY CLUB - HAITI SHELTERBOX APPEAL

Banbury Rotarians, with support from Banbury Cherwell, collected for 3 days in January and raised $\pounds 4,578$ for Shelterbox and everyone involved in the collections was amazed by the fantastic response.

On the first day we were approached in Castle Quay by a teacher who asked if "we did" school presentations? What a good idea – yes we could arrange that – and the rest as they say is history.

So far we have undertaken presentations in 9 local schools and attended fundraising events at 2 local primary schools and the response has been unbelievable – so far the donations received are:

- Bishop Carpenter, North Newington £680.00 (plus £70 Gift Aid)

We have a firm pledge of **£490** from Hanwell Fields School and are currently awaiting the cheque.

Kings Sutton School held a fundraiser on 27th February and have agreed to fund at least one Box.

We are erecting the Shelterbox tent and a display for the Sibford School assembly on Friday March 5th, at the request of the Head, and leaving it in place for the Young Musician event the following evening. The Bell @ Great Bourton held a coffee morning which we attended and raised £531.00 for the appeal.

We have sent cheques for **£8,330** to Shelterbox which funds **17** Shelterboxes

Rotarians Fairbairn, Webb & Wolstencroft visited Shelterbox HQ at Helston on Saturday 13th February to find out more about the set up and handed over a presentation cheque to Shelterbox

<u>My Job/My Life – Paul Gardiner.</u>

Once again a talk by one of our own members proved to be absorbingly interesting. Paul gave a very full account of his working life, spoke openly about his personal life and his community involvement. The attention given and the numerous questions which followed bore testimony to the interest to which Paul's life story gave rise. He revealed that he was born an Essex Welshman, an interesting combination. More of his personal life later.

Born in Essex but with one Welsh parent Paul reckons that he has heard most jokes about He rose through the grammar inherited traits. school system eventually to move to the land of his fathers graduating from the University of Cardiff with a degree in chemistry. This took him initially to Expandite, a subsidiary of Burmah/ Castrol which manufactured sealants. Watching sealants weather on roofs for an inordinate time might well explain why, after only two years, Paul moved on to Ever Ready batteries at their central laboratories in Harringey working with many other chemists and mechanical engineers carrying out research and development on battery systems and how to manufacture them.

Much of this on the development of alkali/manganese batteries which in the late '70s led him to one of the Cramic Engineering factories in Banbury, largely owned by Ever Ready. He then helped to install small factory units in Florence, Cologne and Newcastle, paying regular visits to them which were welcomed by the Italians, with "now you are here we do not need to worry"; resented by the Germans because he knew more than them ; but he was unsure about the Geordies as he never overcame the language problem.

Sadly Ever Ready were taken over, asset stripped and batteries were brought in from Japan and badged Ever Ready. Paul decided it was time to move on.

He became self-employed forming a building maintenance, cleaning, gardening, painting and decorating business with 80 employees. He diversified into slot machines which dispensed products as diverse as children's toys and novelty condoms (not at the same site). Though this work was busy and stressful it gave him flexibility and enabled him to attend his sons' school functions. He retired seven years ago at the age of 56 (one of our younger members!).

As to his personal life, Paul, in his own words, " managed to con a fantastic lady, Sue, into marriage straight after university", sadly three years ago after 42 years of marriage, Sue died. "The hardest thing with which I have ever had to cope" Paul told us. Besides being the mother of their two sons she had a distinguished career culminating in her becoming Managing Director of Millward Brown plc of Warwick. Their two sons both graduated from the University of Cardiff, seemingly drawn to this seat of learning by their father informing them that it had the longest 'Union' bar in Britain.

In the Community, Paul served the Scout movement for over 20 years, 10 as Chairman of Bodicote Scouts and he is still involved in many wavs. He also became involved in CAB on his retirement, at various, and frequently overlapping times he has been an adviser, quality audit assessor, case checker, trainer, board member and supervisor. Currently he is an advisor and Paul said that he feels that Cab work supervisor. is very worthwhile for the community and he finds it both stressful and rewarding, particularly when it is possible to make a real difference for a client.

He paid tribute to Ron Sharpe as a long term and very active board member. For relaxation in his spare time he is studying for a degree in mathematics!

He summed up his life saying that it had been divided into working – for others, for himself, for nothing.

My knowledge of Paul is confined to CAB where I know him as a leading and highly respected voluntary member of staff held in high regard by all and one who always lifts the spirits when in the bureau.

In January 2007 I agreed to fund the building of a 6 classroom extension at the school and as most of you will have seen in my last Newsletter the 6 classrooms were "officially" opened in June when I last visited.

The good news is that ALL the work was completed by the end of July and a major step forward is that at the request of the community elders secondary school classes started at the school in September.

I have also funded the refurbishment of the original classrooms as they needed some general repair work to floors & ceilings and re-painting throughout and the majority of the work was completed over the Christmas holidays and I will be funding the remainder in the next couple of weeks.

Royal Grammar School, High Wycombe

In November I did a presentation to the pupils in their assembly and as a result received a cheque for £250. A big thank you to Roy Page, Headmaster, for inviting me and to the school for their great support.

Christopher Rawlins Primary School, Adderbury

In December I was the guest at the school assembly and the school raised $\pounds70$ by asking the children to send "alternative" Christmas cards to each other – this was in the form of a notice board with messages to each other. As well as supporting Sierra Leone it also resulted in a "green" Christmas at the school.

SPEAKER REPORTS.

WINIFRED ROBINSON "You and Yours" Programme BBC Radio 4

A large audience of Rotarians and Inner Wheel members enjoyed an excellent talk on the 29th January by Winifred Robinson.

Winifred is an editorial member of a team of 25 who produce the BBC Radio 4 programme 'You and Yours' on a daily basis.

'You and Yours', where she is one of the main presenters, is a consumer programme which seeks among other things to expose the malpractice of what are commonly called scams. These are usually where ordinary people are cheated financially. The programme has been credited with a string of exposures which forewarn listeners about con tricks which could cost the members of the public many thousands of pounds.

'You and Yours' has a following of 5 million regular listeners, which stands up well with other similar programmes. Winifred also has the responsibility of designing the questions which other interviewers should ask. She indicated that she believed that probing questions were more productive than the beligerent questions employed by some other radio and TV presenters.

Winifred proved to be a very agile speaker and was more than a match for the traditional banter from the floor. Brian Croft.

An Ambassadorial scholar was the speaker on the 5th. February.

Ambassadorial Scholar Satoko Horii is presently studying at St Hilda's College Oxford for her MSc in 'Forced Migration'. She comes from Atika in northern Japan and her family comprises of her mother, father, a younger sister and an older brother. The Atika region has a population of about 1 million and it is predominantly rural. We were told that there are two memorable events in the area each year, one a 'paper lantern festival' the other 'a snow hut festival'.

Satoko obtained a BA in Sociology in 2004, worked for 6 months in Japan then travelled to Guadalajora, Mexico where she worked for 2 years at the Japanese Embassy and whilst in Mexico learned to speak Spanish. She spent 3 months in Dublin where she learned to speak English and by 2009 she had achieved a MA in 'International Public Administration'. Her studies now, amongst other things, centre around EU border control and UK Citizenship. She said how indebted she felt towards the Japanese Rotary Club / District that had sponsored her. Her final thoughts were 'Think local, act global and think global, act local'. Speaker host Graham Anker

OUR SPEAKER on 12th February was Shiralyn Hunt who is the fund raising co-ordinator for Oxfordshire for Marie Curie Cancer Care. This charity provides palliative care and respite care for terminally ill cancer patients. Typically a Marie Curie Nurse will provide palliative care for cancer patients to enable them to die at home, starting a shift at about 10.00 p.m. and finishing at about 6.30 a.m.

There are 8 Marie Curie Nurses in Oxfordshire, of whom 4 are contracted nurses who are employed full time, and 4 Bank nurses who are either retired or have jobs elsewhere. One night shift costs £160. One week costs £1120.

She is urgently looking for help for any of their fund raising ventures namely :-

Anyone for Tennis Fields of Hope (a gardening scheme) Rise to the Challenge.

Things like running, abseiling, mountaineering. Shiralyn herself took part, with other colleagues, in a climb of Mount Etna in Sicily, raising £22,000, and had some photographs to prove it.

The Great Daffodil Appeal. This is their flagship event for which she is looking for helpers who can give 2 hours of their time collecting especially at Tesco in Banbury on 5th and 6th March, Morrisons in Banbury on 12th and 13th March, Banbury town on 25th and 27th March, and Banbury Castle Quay on 3rd April.
