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Fifty years of Rotary Service.



Rotarian Ken Gibbard

Ken gave us a wonderful "pen sketch" of how Rotary in Banbury had changed over the last half century. If only we could all articulate as well at his age! Randolph Webb (editor of the now defunct Banbury Advertiser) inducted Ken in the 1959/1960 year and during his Presidential year (1974/1975) we had our first meeting in the Freemasons Hall. During those early days we held a Donkey Derby in fields which are now part of Queensway and we charged 7/6 for the dance tickets when we entertained the Europeans.

In 1966/67 (Jo Crowder's year) we increased the number of beds in the Horton Hospital from 12 to 36. Walter Smith was also involved with this and his son John was instrumental in providing the Old Peoples Clubroom in Castle Street. A schools debating society ran for several years and extended into neighbouring counties.

Ken was always keen on statistics, especially those of attendance. He would have made a good Sergeant at Arms! And in fact acted as assistant at 5 or 6 District/ R.I.B.I. Conferences. Over his fifty years he worked out that our club had lost 245 members but had gained 245. Attendance hovered at 70% in those days and this figure has been maintained for most of Ken's service, it seems to be our natural size.

Both the Compton (Probus) club and Abbeyfield were launched during Ken's time and we had Betty Walton as our caterer. Ken stressed that our club and all the others in District 109 (as it was then) had complete freedom to develop as they saw fit. They were and are autonomous to a large extent and District is simply there to Co-ordinate and advise. Ken has been chairman of every major and some minor club committees, his favourite being fellowship and house / attendance. He made special mention of Pat & Les Herrington, stalwarts of this and the Inner Wheel clubs. Also Dr. Harry Judge a member around Ken's earlier days. Throughout all his activity Ken ran a 500 acre farm. Sheila (His wife) refreshed many farm walks, he was a magistrate for 25 years, on the Trustee Savings Bank board, on the labour exchange, Chair of Banbury National Farmers Union, of the Banbury Agricultural Association, on the hospital board, tennis and badminton clubs. He was on the Agricultural Land Tribunal and not to forget the Hunt Supporters Club.

Three speakers appeared on April 23rd. to give us information about the District Conference 2011 to be held at the I.C.C. Birmingham. District Governor elect Laurie Cunningham introduced Mark Clayson and Tony Carney who gave us a Power Point presentation outlining the plans for next years Conference. The conference is to be quite different, the venue Birmingham, instead of the usual seaside resorts. An all in one package to include the hotel and the conference registration and events. This is to be £245 per person for couples and £270.00 for singles. There are two hotels booked on the same basis both near to the conference centre. They are the Crown Plaza a 4 star deluxe hotel and Jurys located on Broad Street. All of this is centred on the various attractive shopping and visitor centres such as Cadbury World and the canalised attractions including a selection of bars and restaurants. The dates are 18th to 20th. March 2011. As this venue is

very convenient Banbury Rotarians are encouraged to attend (no excuses as to distance) especially those who have not attended a rotary conference before they should find it an enlightening experience showing the wider view of Rotary. Dragon BoatRacing - Carnival Event Broughton CastleSunday 30th -

May2010

The main event will be the opportunity to take part in all the colour, splendour and pageantry of Dragon Boat Racing. This is an activity dating back over 2,000 years which ostensibly originates from China. Races were a form of rain dance as a prayer to the Dragon, the symbol of water, to send rain to allow crops to grow. It is anticipated that the event will be bigger than the one held in April 2008 as we are aiming for 36 teams instead of 21.





Dragon boats will be provided together with an experienced helmsman and a manned safety boat. So, all that is needed are teams of 11 comprising 10 paddlers and one drummer. Prices have been kept at the 2008 level so in order to take part; each team member needs to raise at least £30 in sponsorship (£330 per boat). However, the price will be reduced to £300 per boat if you enter and payment is received prior to 31st January 2010.

This is a fun team building event for staff, clients and suppliers. There will be plenty to keep you, your families, friends and colleagues occupied and entertained when you are not racing and the more who attend, whether they are participants in the racing or not, the better.

Broughton Castle is a brilliant venue with the racing to be along one straight of the moat and the entire course visible to spectators set against the panoramic background of the Castle and its grounds. If you have not visited previously, then there will be the added bonus of seeing a Castle with much interesting history including an important role in the Civil War and a building which has been used in recent years in a number of successful films.

This year, the proceeds will be distributed by the Rotary Club of Banbury to a range of different charities. So not only will you have a great day, but you will be positively contributing to some very worthwhile causes.

What is Foundation?

A Simple Guide to understanding how The Rotary Foundation functions.

What is The Rotary Foundation?

It is Rotary's own CHARITY and relies solely on Rotarians financial sponsorship be it through individuals or clubs. No one else is raising money for it.

It is one of the largest private charities in the world. Gates Foundation, Warren Basset Foundation are probably larger. Even more remarkably, it is the <u>only</u> major world charity which actually gives back half of what is given! But more of that is explained later.

It is run as a Trust separate from Rotary International but Trustees are appointed by Rotary International from which it also receives administrative backup.

The Assets of the Foundation have been reduced significantly by the recent recession and the Trustees are Meeting in April to further review the position.

The Annual Accounts are published and can be found in the Rotary International Website www.rotary.org

It has been described as OUR bank in that it receives our donations which are accumulated by District. 50% of the total money is allocated back to the District as a D.D.F. (District Designated Fund), the spending of how this money is used is directly decided by the District within certain guidelines.

The remaining 50% is retained in The World Fund of The Foundation to support major programmes but Districts can access some of the money as "Matching Grants", GSE Programmes and others – see later pages of this Booklet.

Funding of The Rotary Foundation.

Annual Programmes Fund. This is where the money donated by Clubs (encouraged to average \$100/club member) or individuals is placed.

Donations can be the result of fundraising events by Clubs, etc.

Also Personal giving using the Sustaining Members Scheme or other suitable methods. Both aimed at a commitment of \$100 per Rotarian per year every year, every year. Donations can attract Gift Aid if the donator is a taxpayer. 50% of money donated is returned to the District from which it is submitted as a District Designated Fund (D.D.F).

50% is retained by The Rotary Foundation in the World Fund to support the Peace and Conflict programmes, Group Study Exchange and clubs/districts humanitarian projects through the matching grant and 3H (Health Hunger and Humanity) system approved by the Trustees.

Permanent Fund.

This is an endowment fund. It receives donations from Benefactors (usually Rotarians) who wish to donate by gift or through their Will to a fund that is then invested in order to support the different programmes of the Rotary Foundation. Only the investment income earned may be transferred to the Annual Programmes fund for its current work.
