Pakistan one year on: how you made a difference

In 2010 Pakistan suffered the worst flooding it had seen for more than 80 years. The floods began in late July after unrelenting monsoon rains and soon around one-fifth of the land was submerged by water. As a member of the ShelterBox team who worked to help those affected by this disaster, I wanted to share a personal story about one family I met during that time.

I came across Abdurazar, his wife Rahmat and their five children struggling to survive with no shelter and little food. They had fled their

village, Bash Rangoo, to escape the rising flood water which had completely destroyed their home -they had lost everything. Homeless, Abdurazar felt he needed to stay with his family to keep them safe, but this meant he could not work and earn money to buy food and support them.

Abdurazar was just one of the 11 million people who lost their homes in the flooding and were forced to live in wretched conditions, beside roads, sleeping in the open, with little food or clean water. On that day I was able to give Abdurazar's family their own ShelterBox and this gift meant they now had somewhere they could call their own.

Your ShelterBox, was among the 8,767 delivered to families like Abdurazar's in Pakistan. By October 2010 we had helped over 140,000 people.

My words will not be able to express the gratitude of Abdurazar and his family when they received their ShelterBox. The tent meant they now had a home, Abdurazar was able to go to work and his family could start to rebuild their lives.

Thank you for continuing to support our work.

Who is Ray Burman

Rotary Internationa in Great Britain & Ire and

Ray Burman has been a Rotarian since January 1995 and served Rotary as RI Membership Coordinator, trainer, facilitator and moderator at many Rotary seminars and meetings. He and wife Victoria have been privileged to act as RI President Representative on a number of occasions. Burman, as he prefers to be known, is a Foundation Major Donor, Bequest Society Member and Foundation Benefactor. Burman has received Rotary's Service Above Self Award in 2009. While District Governor in 2003/04, Burman inspired clubs to support and fund Dream Villages in District 3220, Sri Lanka, forging a connection with RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe's concept of a DREAM team. Clubs donated US\$450,000, which has funded 145 low cost shelter houses and two schools in Sri Lanka. During his year as DG, annual giving to The Rotary Foundation doubled. During 2002/03 Burman met with Wilkin & Sons, manufacturer of preserves and negotiated the production of 60,000 jars of marmalade with an RI Spread & Save label as a fund-raising initiative for The Rotary Foundation. At the 2004 RI Institute, RIBI Foundation Chairman Paul Buyers revealed that the amount raised by the Spread & Save marmalade was US\$1 million. Burman has a history of raising money for charity since 1983 - by undertaking endurance events with personal sponsorship - having completed 25 marathons and 158 half marathons. In May 2000 he cycled from Florida to California, covering over 3000 miles, visiting Rotary Clubs promoting and raising funds for The Rotary Foundation.

Burman has served his local community by being involved with his local church and was founder chairman and member of The Friends of St. Luke's Parish Church, a member of the Homeless Persons Soup Run group and was founder member of Tiptree Medical Centre Patient's Board. He sat as a board member of the NE Essex PCT Patient & Public Involvement Panel, School Governor, Parish Councillor and village tree warden.

He holds a Masters degree in Business Administration and a Diploma in Management Studies. Burman is a member of the Rotary Club of Kelvedon and District.

Needless to say he is very proud of his collection and rightly so and our thanks goes to Charles for a very successful evening.

SPEAKER REPORTS.

The Evening Meeting with partners held on 29th July at the Freemasons Hall was exceptional on two counts. Firstly the dinner was excellent and to a high standard and secondly we were treated to an excellent talk by Nicola McHugh. Nicola's subject was Tristan De Cunha where she had worked as an advisor to the nurses there for a 6 week period. The presentation started with an outline of the history of the island and how it came to be populated, and that the founding families descendants still lived on the Island to this day. The Island situated in mid Atlantic is very remote and has great difficulty in landing goods and passengers as there is not a harbour capable of taking larger ships, everything including passengers have to be off loaded onto smaller boats.

Nicola then told of her experiences in attempting to upgrade the knowledge of the nursing staff at the local hospital. This proved to be far harder than expected as the level of expertise was much lower than expected. We were then told of the Sea life which abounded in the local waters which together with some excellent pictures made for a very interesting and fascinating presentation, much enjoyed by all. 5th August. My Job My life:- Rotarian Eric Watson

A Manchester lad by birth, Eric and wife Wendy hauled from Cheshire. They have been married for over 50 years and have two daughters and five grandchildren. Family members and old friends lived near Culworth and in order to be near them all, Eric and Wendy moved to this area some 13 years ago.

Eric's professional life is in Building Services, starting his career as an Apprentice with G.N.Haden & Sons Ltd. A long established firm of Heating and Ventilation specialists. During this time Eric qualified in Project management in these subjects, attending part time at the National College for Heating, Ventilation and air Conditioning in London.

He then did his National Service with the R.A.F., latterly with a Signals Intelligence unit in Germany. During his time with Hadens Eric was involved with several large contracts including the new Manchester Airport, Fords Transmission Plant at Hailwood and a science block for Manchester College of Technology & Science. Eventually he was offered the post of Drawing Office manager in Belfast where happy and busy years were marred by the troubles of 1968. He had his share of bomb scares and security checks and actual bombing in and near his office, which suffered structural damage. He experienced these troubles for eight years instead of the original five, moving out in 1975.

He moved to Morpeth as Commercial Manager, and Eric took over as Branch Manger in 1978. An architect friend introduced him to Rotary in Newcastle and Eric has vivid memories of distributing soup and bread to the "down and outs" living under the railway arches.

In 1983 Eric returned to the Manchester office as Regional Manager and Financial Controller for the North East and Midland regions moving later to Knutsford in Cheshire.

Eric retired in 1993 moving to Culworth then commencing his association with this area. Tom Taylor.

"The Samaritans"

The speakers on Friday 12th August were two Banbury Samaritans, Ruth and Maurice.

The organisation was founded in 1953 by the Rev'd Chad Varah following the suicide of a 14 year old girl. They aim to provide confidential emotional support to those with feelings of distress and despair which might lead on to suicide. This is available throughout Britain and Ireland 24 hours per day and the organisation averages a contact every five seconds! These pleas for help traditionally were by telephone but now include Emails, texts and Facebook contacts. In addition Samaritans are to be found in the community, in schools, prisons and a recent "Feet in the Street" campaign. They also have a telephone on every prison wing in Britain and are currently training selected prisoners as Samaritan helpers.

The Banbury Branch was founded in 1974, currently has 68 volunteers and dealt with 480 contacts per week in the last year. Many contacts are made via mobile phone which can be very expensive, and their telephone bill was approximately £18,000.00 last year.

The interest generated by Ruth and Maurice was reflected in the number of questions which were asked by members.

I was impressed by the statistic that there were 205 volunteers for every paid employee of the Samaritans - another example of the value of voluntary effort in our community.
