## 80 Not Out and Going Strong!



Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> October saw over 120 Rotarians, partners, friends and guests celebrate the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Club's Charter in Banbury Town Hall, the same venue as the first Charter Dinner was held at in 1935.

In 1934 Banbury was still very much a market town and livestock market, Industries apart from the traditional ones associated with agriculture, were few and were relative newcomers to the town. The population was approximately 14,000.

The first meeting of the provisional club was held at the Wincott's Café in South Bar on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> May 1935, and the Inaugural Lunch was arranged for Friday 24<sup>th</sup> May at the same venue.

The Club's Charter which was signed and dated on 24<sup>th</sup> September 1935, was presented at a formal dinner that was held at the Banbury Town Hall on 25<sup>th</sup> October 1935. In the past 80 years Banbury's population has grown to nearly 50,000, and the Rotary Club from the 16 founder members to over 70 members today.

Notable events for the Club during the past 80 years are:

1935 12<sup>th</sup> April - group met in Wincott's Café and decided to start a club.

24<sup>th</sup> May - Inaugural Lunch - 16 Founder members.

25<sup>th</sup> October - Charter Dinner - 167 present with 10 clubs represented, 43 column in Banbury Guardian.

First President - Sidney Ewins 1936 - 46 members.

1936 - 1939 Mainly local service e.g., hospital transport, holidays for needy young people.

Bowls a popular sport and Club successful.

1939 - 1945 Evacuees supported - parties, cinema visits.

Indefinite Leave of Absence & Honorary status for members in forces.

Reduced Subs from 2 to 1½ guineas, 1940-1944.

Adopted Minesweeper MMS15.

1945 Banbury Arts and Crafts Festival - 3,000 entrants over 3 weeks - ran for 15 years.

International - clothing to Holland, etc., disabled children brought over for holidays.

- 1946 Inner Wheel Club of Banbury Chartered.
- 1950 1<sup>st</sup> Party for the Blind still continuing today.

Seven nominations for 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President.

Rota for members serving lunch introduced.

1951 Hosted 1951 District Conference in Bexhill - 4 members on Committees.

Christmas Carol Singing + Salvation Army band in Horsefair - 3,000 people present.

- 1952 Started up Round Table in Banbury.
- 1953 Inaugural meeting of the Rotary Club of Bicester.

The operation is funded entirely by voluntary donations and will shortly be extending its remit by acquiring a new helicopter that can undertake night flights. Ron and Andrew are seen here with some of the flight team.

Andrew is currently in training with Rotary President Ian Calderbank and David Stevens (a partner at Ellacotts who sponsor the Tour de Trigs) to undertake this challenging 24 hour 50-mile cross country orienteering event over the first weekend of December. The team will be raising funds for Shelter and has an aggregate age in the region of 175 years (with David a mere 40 alongside the two granddads). At the other end of the age spectrum, it is anticipated that teams of teenagers who are in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme will also be entering.

One training afternoon for students to advise on navigation, equipment, planning etc. has already been held at Warriner School and a second is planned for early October.

New trophies for Duke of Edinburgh participants in the tough North Oxfordshire endurance/orienteering Tour de Trigs challenge have been sponsored by three of our members, Ron Barnett in memory of his son Andrew, Phil Cavill and Paul Gardiner.

# It's Ruby Giant Time again



It's that time of year again and it was John Bennett this year who agreed to organise merry bands of crocus bulb planters.

The first group set to with a will in a most timely fashion at St. Mary's Churchyard on the day before World Polio Day.

Sara Billins, Principal at North Oxfordshire Academy, brought the school's Horticultural Club to join a group of Rotarians under the guidance of Banbury Park Rangers for an hour or two's spadework on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> October at 2pm.

Together they planted the first 3,000 of some 18,700 bulbs that will find homes this autumn in and around Banbury.

On Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> November the second of John's groups will head for Spiceball Park to plant some 8,000 bulbs - again with the support of North Oxfordshire Academy horticulturalists with possibly a few students from other schools. On the following Thursday the venue will be All Saints Church, Middleton Cheney, where students from Chenderit will join the force.

John is also sorting two other dates - one at the Sunshine Centre and one at Sanctuary Housing's Retirement Living Sites in Grimsbury - where a further 2000+ bulbs will nestle for the winter.

Meanwhile Ron Barnett has been designating pairs of Rotarians to take crocus packs to the ten Banbury Town Primary Schools who accepted our offer to supply and plant a pack. These visits will all take place during November.

Ron is also negotiating with a well-known personality who has suffered from Polio to be our special guest at one of the crocus concerts - on either March 8<sup>th</sup> or 10<sup>th</sup> at St Mary's Church, Horsefair, and if possible talk to students at one or two of the schools.

I'm delighted to report that all eight secondary schools have again agreed to perform in celebration

of the blooming crocus swards and to raise further funds to End Polio Now!

In celebration of World Polio Day our raffle raised a magnificent £256 for End Polio Now. Our very grateful thank goes to the Wroxton House Hotel for their donation of the prize of a Sunday Lunch for four people which we are sure our winner, Bob Thompson, will very much enjoy

# Calling all Young Chefs



The Rotary Club of Banbury is once again searching for young people who want to develop their cookery skills and take part in the Rotary National Young Chef competition.

The competition is open to all students in full time education between ages 11 and 17 on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2015, and comprises four stages leading to the National Finals in Leicester on Saturday 23<sup>th</sup> April 2016.

The first local heats will take place at Banbury and Bicester College on Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2016.

Entry to the competition is free and a full information package, including an application form is available from Rotarian Bernard Goodchild bernardgoodchild@timetalk.co.uk , tel. 01295 279227. Each local finalist is asked to prepare a three course meal for 2 within a cost of £15.

Each finalist receives a free Chef's jacket, hat and apron; can also be given support by Executive Chef, Jim Eaves of the Banbury House Hotel and Chair of the local judging team.

Finalists will be able to use the facilities at the College by prior arrangement to practice in advance. The National Winner receives a trophy, £250, and an opportunity to gain work experience in a London restaurant.

This represents an excellence personal development opportunity for those young people who have an

interest in cooking and/or a career in hospitality and catering. The aim is to encourage young people to:

- Learn how to cook a healthy meal
- Develop food presentation skills
- Consider food hygiene issues
- Develop organisational and planning skills
- Develop an ability to cope in a demanding situation

## Speaker Reports

## Malcolm Douglas – Long serving member



On 9<sup>th</sup> October our very own Malcolm Douglas gave us an insight into 'His Life so far'.

When he was born, the whole country celebrated -May 10<sup>th</sup> 1945 two days after Germany`s bid for world domination came to an end for a 2<sup>nd</sup> time.

His parents were Fred and Connie who came south from Yorkshire in 1930, He was 4<sup>th</sup> of 6 children his mum had over 25 years. Home was Rayners Lane, leafy suburb of North London. His first memories are his pram, playing on bomb sites, bringing a live incendiary bomb home and getting lost in smog.

His father, Fred, had left the police in 1947 and went to manage a shop in Harrow. In 1950 he joined Double 2 as a rep, but he had his eyes open for a shop of his own, and in 1953 settled on a site in Bicester.

On a very wet evening Family Douglas washed up at 42 Sheep Street. The suburban kids took one look and said can we go home.

Attending primary school, then secondary, and after a string of poor reports at 13 he was packed of to boarding school - Clare School Brympton`D Evercy near Yeovil

He loved it and despite a total Maths blockage his English and History were good enough to get him into the 'A' stream.

He traded preparation notes on maths with his friend Cross Major in return for his notes on English.

A wonderful time of his life.

In 1962 he left school with a handful of 'O' levels not including maths. Cross Major passed English but he failed maths!

Cross is now Emeritus Professor of Geomatical Engineering at Imperial College London.

Malcolm then completed London College of Fashion 18-month course during which time he lived in a Flat in Earls Court with three other lads, and Girls upstairs!!

During his weekends at home he met girl who was Rtn. Bryan Doe's secretary and who he was to marry some years later.

1964 saw him leave college with City and Guilds in Tailoring and design, when he went to spend a year at Walters in Oxford, which was just like 'Are you being served', and then back to Henrys, but not Bicester.

1966 He rented 71 High St Banbury in 1966 which was opposite 'Clinkards'. It was tiny but a good training ground.

He bought 52 High Street in 1970 and married Bryan's secretary and they moved into the flat above the shop. His Dad told him that if the shop was not successful they would be bust.

He moved to Chatsworth Drive in 1971, got divorced in 1973 by which time he had paid off the loan on the shop. He then started "Allen and Douglas Commercial Clothing".

In 1974 he met Val in Midland Bank, who was 'the one' and they married in 1975 and bought their house in Royal Oak Lane.

He enjoyed many buying trips abroad to Finland, France and Germany, and in 1981 his son, James, was born. The family bought a villa in Spain in 1983 where they had many happy Holidays.

He sold "Allen and Douglas" in 1984 and bought a shop in Market Harborough, which he sold some 10 years later.

In 1995 he bought 'Alex House' at rear of his current shop which he converted and let as managed offices.

The firm was split up in 2004, Malcolm took on Henrys of Banbury Ltd and his brother Tony Henrys of Bicester Ltd.

His son, James, married in 2011.

His Service Club history started with 10 years in Round Table both in Bicester and Banbury, and in 1987 Maurice introduced him to Rotary.

He recorded the best part of his Club membership had been introducing many new members to the Club and the wonderful fellowship.

The Douglas family have run a successful family business in Banbury for 39 years, Malcolm's son, James, beings the third generation.

Malcolm cares passionately about the health of the town centre, has chaired the Chamber of Commerce and campaigns tirelessly for limited free car parking to help retailers increase trade.

## Mike Grocott - Banbury Space Studio



On 16<sup>th</sup> October we were delighted to receive as our speaker Mike Grocott, Founding Principal the Banbury Space Studio. Mike spoke of his passion for sciences and space exploration and said that although we do not hear a great deal about the contributions made in this country to space exploration, we do in fact make a huge impact.

There is planned shortly a mission to the International Space Centre and the UK's first member of the Human Space Programme, Tim Peakes, will be one of a team of six, the others being American and Russian. They are due to launch at 11.03 am on December 15<sup>th</sup> this year and will spend six months in space. Tim's mission is not only to inspire a new generation of scientists and engineers but also to look at long duration space flight in preparation for future missions.

Mike then spoke about the Space Studio Banbury, which is the first school in the county to deliver the school curriculum through the context of space, science, and engineering. They do not touch on arts and humanities at all.

Space Studio Banbury is, as its name suggests a studio school, which means that it only has four year groups and a maximum capacity of 300. All students that choose to attend the school need to have an interest in mathematics and science, they are also taught business and enterprise. Mike is passionate about the fact that the school is not a hothouse for university, his aim is that one third of the students in fact go to on to higher education, but another third serve apprenticeships and the final third start their own businesses. Before training and moving into teaching Mike served for 12 years in the Royal Navy as an Artificer, so he has a real awareness of the need for more apprentices in the engineering world.

The Space Industry in the UK is rapidly expanding even during the recent recession and it is vital that we produce young people with the skills to enable them to move into this sphere of work.

Mike certainly showed great enthusiasm for his work which must surely rub off on his students.

Ken Norman – Laughing all the way from the bank



We were delighted on 23<sup>rd</sup> October to welcome Ken Norman as our speaker, when he entertained us with his talk "Laughing all the way from the bank".

Ken was born in Essex and joined NatWest Bank from school as he was not sure that his love for theatre and entertaining would provide a career that would impress his family as "steady" enough. He did however continue to pursue his interest in this area becoming a very active member of his local theatre group and performing in a wide variety of plays after his day job.

Ken's career with the bank progressed well, and eventually he took on a role which allowed him to capitalise on his love of standing in front of an audience becoming a trainer at the bank's college at Heythrop Park. It was here he started to work with his future business partner Tim Lyon.

However, this stage of his life came to an end with the take-over of NatWest by RBS when it became apparent to Ken that NatWest was not going to be the same institution he knew and loved going forwards.

Ken and Tim had both worked for a bank for some years but were both frustrated entertainers. So they took the opportunity offered by voluntary redundancy late in 1999 and left the bank to start the New Millennium with their own training company, "New Tricks Training".

However, before starting work on this enterprise in earnest they took a year's sabbatical, pursuing a very different direction with New Tricks Productions.

They set about writing comedy sketches and learning to sing and tap-dance, with the aim of hiring out a West End theatre and putting on their own show! They sought advice from Ronnie Barker, and despite his expressed views being none too positive they stuck at it and produced the material needed to go ahead.

They hired Her Majesty's Theatre in the heart of the West End, home to Phantom of the Opera.

Unfortunately, they had unwittingly chosen to put on their show in London slap-bang in the middle of the Edinburgh Festival 13<sup>th</sup> August 2000!

They were about the only comedy on in London that night with not a single agent, talent scout, comedy producer still in London. Notwithstanding this they managed to get an audience of 650 in and the show was both a great success and the experience of a lifetime.


